Synopsis of a personal letter from the Countess Stella Andrassy

Stella says:

"The more I think of it, the more I begin to see that my whole life has been a preparation for being able to understand the message of the Master."

She goes on to tell about the people she knew and had met as she was growing up in Sweden: Annie Besant, J. Krishnamurti, scientist Sven Hedin, Her father wrote books about Soren Kierkegaard and Goethe. Her mother was a concert pianist.

Later in her life, she had "private talks" with Pope Pius XII and Paul VI, Rabindranath Tagore, Richard Strauss (composer), Professor Wilhelm, the man who translated the I Ching from the original Chinese into German.

She goes on:

"It would be all too long to describe all that which destined me to understand the Bhagwan's books. I have read-reread and continue to read them every day. During this very difficult winter, it helped me to take the hardships as they came and to work myself out of trouble."

Stella is 83 years old and can no longer walk. Her husband, Imre, 99, has been ill and she talks about her concern about Bhagwan. "We can't let him leave us. He is so needed."

Here is a copy of the letter I wrote  
on the Bhagwan's behalf. - Hope it

The more I think of it - the more I  
begin to see that my whole life  
has been a preparation for being  
able to understand the message  
of The Master.

First of all, my parents, and my  
home - filled with love, music, history,  
art, spiritual interests. - everything  
is a joyful and dignified industry.

Annie Besant was my mother's  
house-guest, whenever she was in  
Sweden. - I was educated in a home  
school by a lovely couple, who had  
lived for years in India. - Later

I met Krishnamurti in Budapest and had a long private talk with him. The great Swedish scientist, Sven Hedin, was often a guest in our home. It was he who woke my interest for Tibet, and Tibetan life. - Then our library... Pope loved the mystics, Jacob Böhm, Meister Eckhart, Angelus Silesius, and many more, and was telling me about them. He wrote a wonderful book about Sören Kirkegaard and about Goethe. The best introduction to these wonder-men I ever read. - Mother was a concert pianist a pupil of Therese Carreno - who's pupil I also became. All my visits always came to Mother to get help and encouragement. - I can't describe it all. It was the most perfect home, ever existed. Grandmother was a Svedenborgian. - The cook belonged to the Salvation Army. The house echoed of songs and prayers and laughs. -

Also had a long private talk with Pope Pius XI. and Pius XII. that is given here in the enclosed letter.

When I met personally in an home  
Tajore my love for India became  
intensified. - Richard Strauss was  
also a guest, when he came to Stockholm  
to conduct his own masterpieces. -  
And so my life was destined to  
continue to study - and to help those  
who were less fortunate than I was.  
Later in life in Vienna and Bayreuth.  
I got to know Prof. Wilhelm, one  
through his the "Y Ching" and the  
"Golden Flower."

I would be all too long to describe all  
that which destined me to understand the  
Bhepuon's books, that you gave me.

I have read - re-read - and continue to read  
them every day. During this very difficult

 worried about the Bhegevan. - I  
 am praying for his and his life -  
 waste. but it is difficult to reach  
 him. There is a cloud of something  
 I can't penetrate around ontelero.  
 Hope is well dispersed. We can't let  
 him leave us. He is so needed. Please  
 let me know how things are.
